Students will be able to:

OBJECTIVES:

- Describe specific events in Helen Zia's life that illustrate her activism; identify other figures who are important in the growth of APIA activism; expand their understanding of what it means to be an "American" activist.
- Explore ways in which they might strive to improve the lives of others and the society around them.

ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS:

• How does Helen Zia's life exemplify the desire to bring about a better life for all in America?

BACKGROUND:

ACTIVITIES:

This lesson plan is about activist Helen Zia who was involved in advocating for the Vincent Chin civil rights case in the 1980s. She is a successful journalist, serving as executive editor for Ms. magazine. She was a witness in the court case Perry v. Schwarzenegger which legalized same-sex marriage in California. She is also an author and public speaker.

Introduction

Class activity: Name as many Asian-American activists, figures, or key events in history as possible.

Depending on the demographics, age, and local curriculums, the students' input will vary. The point of this exercise is to expose to students the lack of representation in their current curriculum.

Direct Instruction

Helen Zia's Life and Career

There is a short video (4:34) available about Helen Zia's career, featuring the Vincent Chin civil rights case. It is a good introduction to Helen Zia, who provides her own commentary on her life events in the video.

Vincent Chin Civil Rights Case

There is a short video available about the Vincent Chin case, told by Asian-Americans. The instructor can choose to show the video to explain the Vincent Chin case or use the available resources to explain the case themselves.

Guided Practice/Independent Practice

Examine periodicals and other sources about Helen Zia and Vincent Chin to fill out a worksheet or complete a general digital scavenger hunt on various Asian-American activists or do more in-depth research on Helen Zia.

Closure

Have a discussion with the class about the people they chose to make profiles for.
